## **Institutional Strength**

1. Traditionally, the college always had a scholarly faculty ably supported by the stakeholders in formulating and discharging policies for the moral and academic uplift of students. It has a set of highly motivated teachers, many of whom are involved in active research and Post-Graduate teaching as guest lecturers at various universities.
2. Environment and value based education to include areas such as climate change, pollution, waste management, sanitation, conservation of biological diversity, management of biological resources, development of humanistic, ethical and universal human values.
3. Decentralization of power and distribution of work force through different academic bodies ensures free flow of knowledge and transparency in managerial activities.
4. Some faculty members have taken up advanced academic projects in collaboration with other universities and research institutes.
5. High success rate in undergraduate and postgraduate courses has enabled large number of students to pursue further studies at various Universities and research institutes. This is due to outcome based approach to higher education.
6. Involvement of students outside class hours in various clubs like Music and drama, Painting and Photography, Journalism, Save Nature and natural habitats, NCC, Sports and fitness, NSS, under the leadership of nodal and program officers create holistic development of participants.

4. To conduct more number of seminars and availability of a fully functional auditorium for this purpose is a necessity.
5. Absence of full time faculty in many subjects dilute the teaching learning process.
6. Very few students appear for state and national level competitive exams.

## **Institutional Opportunity**

1. Apart from routine structured classes for students within the time frame, special emphasis can be given to train them through soft skill development courses and to enhance their vocabulary power so as to brighten their employment opportunities.
2. Extensive use of technology in teaching learning, removing language barriers, increasing access for Divyang students, and educational planning and management.
3. As part of women empowerment programme, special emphasis has been given to build women entrepreneurs under the banner "PRAYASHI" through effective training, exposure and motivational programmes. Opportunity is there to create incubation centers for sustainable development.

4. It is time for the college now for giving a new orientation to the course structure as given in NEP 2020 so as to march ahead with the needs of the time. The proposed expansion may take note of the needs and aspirations of the people of the catchment area of the institution. More Courses in Management, IT and agro-based aspects may be introduced.
5. To explore possibilities of creating a liaison with the nearby small and medium scale industries involving the exchange of information or ideas.

### **Institutional Challenge**

1. Since almost 65 percent students enrolled are female, institution pays special emphasis to programmes that involve women empowerment. Introduction of self defense classes to boost their confidence and to train them to take this martial art as their career option/profession is one of the challenges taken by the institution.
2. Yoga and meditation classes are held for those interested in such activities and all under one roof within the campus. It is an institutional challenge to bring peace, bliss and relaxation in students' mind.
3. The college has already enrolled for skill development courses in Travel and Hospitality management, Information Technology Enabled Services and Mushroom cultivation under Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikash Yojana (PMKVY 4.0) with teachers from Commerce, Physics, Chemistry and Economics department as nodal officers. College is committed to introduce more such certificate courses in a phased manner.
4. Equity and inclusion as the cornerstone of all educational decisions to ensure that all students are able to thrive in the education system and the institutional environment is responsive to differences to ensure that high quality education is available for all.
5. To induct more full time teachers in the teaching community to further augment the education process.
6. To reduce the drop out rate below 10% in next 3-4 years.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

The course curriculum to be followed in affiliated colleges as per University Statute is set by the parent university. Ramsaday college being affiliated to the University of Calcutta, the parent university designs the curriculum for all undergraduate and post graduate courses. The university has adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) since 2017 for B.Com and from 2018-19 academic session for M.A., B.A. and B.SC programmes. Apart from CBCS, annual system of examination for casual students continued till 2022.

In skill enhancement course (SEC) and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) courses under CBCS, institutes have the freedom to choose topics as per requirement of the students and availability of trained teachers to deliver the lectures. Keeping in mind the future prospects and job opportunities, these courses are selected by the departments in a manner that will give them a distinct advantage in their future endeavour to higher education. For lab based subjects, special attention is given to purchase and installation of laboratory equipments for better dissemination of knowledge and skill. This pedagogical approach across the sciences, social sciences, humanities and sports promote interdisciplinary education, integration with skill and ability enhancement courses. All academic activities and outcomes are systematically documented in departmental log books and record registers.

College has introduced several honours and General programs in B.A and B.Sc. after 2nd cycle of accreditation. Sociology Honours (2015), Philosophy Honours (2015), Anthropology Honours (2015), Botany Honours (2015) were introduced in the course curriculum. Music (2015), Journalism & Mass Communication (2019) and Microbiology (2019) were introduced as General programs. Post graduate regular course (2 year M.A degree) in Bengali literature was introduced from the academic session 2016-17 as per demands and aspirations of the people. Eighteen Honours and twenty five general core subjects are available in the three streams of Arts, Commerce and Science providing for 95 subject combinations.

For proper and effective implementation of the curriculum within the allotted time frame of academic calendar, the syllabus is distributed among the teachers according to the work load prescribed by academic bodies. Lesson plan and class routine is prepared accordingly before commencement of classes and is notified to the students through social platforms. Regular departmental meetings are conducted to keep a systematic record of the activities planned and progress made by students. Students who lag behind are further enrolled in remedial classes to give them the much needed thrust and the confidence before semester exams.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Different genres of methods are adopted to add completeness to the education system. Though conventional chalk and talk method is mostly followed, teachers are also equipped with high end technical tools to add a distinct flavor in the teaching learning process. Several departments make use of charts and models, audio-visual techniques, free software usage from approved digital platforms. There are at present 8 ICT enabled classrooms and more are on the pipelines to be upgraded in a phased manner. The college has 113 computers out of which 13 are for administrative purposes stationed at college office. This increase, from 76 computers in 2012, accounts for 48% rise in number of computers. The entire campus has *wi-fi* facilities and most departments have internet connectivity with option of unlimited use of data.

Even the deadly pandemic period that lasted for nearly eighteen months could not deter our efforts to plan and implement the course curriculum. Regular online classes were held as per structured class routine through effective use of digital platforms. Taking into consideration poor network connectivity in rural regions, class lessons in the form of e-materials were uploaded periodically by faculty members on college portal. A virtual laboratory based training and demonstration was given to science students through effective collaboration with Amrita Viswa Vidyapeetham University.

Teachers and students are also encouraged to attend seminars/webinars/conferences and financial assistance is also provided for this purpose. The effective communication course in English for both teachers and students is aimed at overcoming stage fright and shyness and will help students improve their diction, embrace the power of expression and be more relaxed and spontaneous while in the company of people. Field trips are arranged by various departments as part of experiential learning process to give the students a unique opportunity of hands on training and on field experience on subject materials.

The University appoints examiners through the Teacher Assignment module (TAM) uploaded on college portal. Several teachers have been assigned the responsibility of Head examiners of various courses and a few have received appointment letters as paper setters and moderators. Principal and a senior teacher are serving as

reviewers for several national and international journals. Principal has reviewed almost 20 manuscripts in UGC approved journals in the last five years and has also evaluated a Ph.D thesis as external supervisor. He is also serving the editorial board of two international journals.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

Research and development committee has been set up with Principal as chairman and faculty members to oversee research activities. Teachers are encouraged to engage in various minor and major research projects with financial assistance from state and central agencies. During the past five years (2017-2022), nine research projects with total grant of rupees twenty three lakhs sixty thousand have been completed. Three scholars (each from Chemistry, Mathematics and Bengali) have been awarded Ph.D degrees with college teachers as Ph.D supervisors. Out of 32 full time teachers at present, 23 have Ph.D qualifications and that amounts to 72%. This can be considered a significant rise compared to mere 14% Ph.D holders during second cycle of accreditation.

State Aided College teachers in service at our institution are financially supported to carry our minor projects and rupees approximate three lakhs have been spent for this purpose in last five years. Outcome of these project works are published as articles in our in-house journal 'BUDHIL' with ISSN number. Most of the teachers are engaged in regular publication of papers and articles in national and international journals and many have contributed to book chapters and scholarly aptitude books for students. 104 papers have been published in UGC care journals and almost 40 in other academic platforms.

The research findings from the department of Mathematics on 'Analysing and forecasting the disastrous effect of COVID-19 through a case study' and 'Challenging the severity of Dengue using Type-I and Type-2 fuzzy inference systems' have been submitted to the President, Indian Medical Association, Bengal State Branch, Kolkata to explore the initial findings for further inroads in the field of medical sciences. A separate research lab has been set up to promote research activities and a common place to demonstrate the working principles of several scientific equipments. The synergy and focus of research has preferably been aligned to National priorities.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

Ramsaday college is well equipped to offer quality education at UG and PG levels. The college building has

two parts clearly distinguishable by their colour contours, a heritage part (1946-1976) and a portion constructed in the nineties and thereafter. At present it has 40 fully functional class rooms and 12 well equipped laboratories to ensure smooth conduct of academic activities. The entire campus has wi fi facilities from JIO connectivity. Ten science departments have separate blocks to carry out their departmental activities. Apart from these, lush green landscape, flower gardens, open spaces, clean water bodies provide a congenial environment for academic pursuits.

? The college has a separate post graduate Bengali department with three assigned class rooms and a separate library with open access system to students and staff.

? A fully functional automated library of approximately 3500 square feet area accommodates over 26000 text and reference books, over 400 journals and separate reading zones for students and faculty. The library has internet and reprography facilities and is under CCTV surveillance. Apart from the central library, departments have their own libraries created from specimen copies and books donated by alumni members. There is an air-conditioned annexe room for reading purpose which remains open from 10'30 am to 4'30pm.

? A well decorated auditorium with seating capacity of 200 is situated at the second floor of Vivekananda bhawan and has very recently been upgraded with air-conditioned facilities.

? The college office which is air-conditioned has separate blocks for cash section, accounts, server room, head clerk's room, store room, working place and scholarship section. All processes have been streamlined to minimize waiting period for beneficiaries.

? College has multi gym facilities and open spaces for physical exercise and NCC activities. The apparatus that were dysfunctional during the covid period have been repaired and put in use again.

? There is a separate enclosure for herbal garden and vermi-composting technique and a weather station/observatory for monitoring weather related parameters. All measuring devices have been calibrated by the Indian Metereological department to ensure error free forecasts.

? College has separate boys' and girls' common room with indoor sports facilities. The girls' common room has sanitary napkin vending machine and an incinerator maintained exclusively by student representatives.

? There are ramps and handrails in several areas, divyangjan toilet, non-slip Braille fitted tiles as signage, screen reading software and device for specially challenged and visually impaired students.

### **Student Support and Progression**

Periodic counseling by teaching staff, flexibility of subject choice combination from among different programs, freeship to students from financially weak families, education support in form of fee concession, concession in field trip expenses, sincere effort to get scholarships for all deserving candidates, involving students in various academic and community activities, creating job opportunities for them through introduction of skill development courses, certificate courses in communicative English through effective use of language lab are prime steps taken from our end to reduce the drop out rate from 30% in 2012, which was alarmingly high . We are indeed happy to note that there is a steady decrease in drop out numbers from 2016 onwards and the figure has reached around 16 %. Efforts are on by IQAC to reduce it further to below the double digit figure in next four years.

The real time problem is to get the student attendance healthy in all the programs. Students who have less than 60% attendance after first one month update are cautioned and then, if the same shortfall is noticed, guardians are intimated and their scholarship applications are rejected on grounds of insufficient eligibility. IQAC has implemented freeship for students who have more than 98% attendance in various programs and are given preferences to avail the language lab certificate course. Regular students with good attendance record get priority to participate in job oriented courses offered within the campus. As recommended by the sports committee, deserving students are provided all sorts of assistance and encouraged to pursue a successful career in the field of sports. These pedagogical approaches and measures offered to students have evoked good response and attendance of students has improved considerably.

Counseling and placement activities have also been strengthened. The toughest challenge is however faced by the placement cell to hire recruiting agencies or companies for providing jobs to potential seekers immediately after graduation. The placement committee has however formed an agreement with agencies like Anudip soft skill provider and Edubridge for conducting skill oriented classes and with Maple Accessories Pvt Ltd (since 2019) as an industry partner. Entrepreneurship awareness camps were conducted at our end as motivational endeavors for younger generation. Female entrepreneurs are specially encouraged, trained and motivated under our institute banner "PRAYASHI".

Despite several hardships, the effort of the committee members deserves all praise for their commendable achievements as evidenced from placement records and student satisfaction survey.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

The college authority firmly believes in decentralization of responsibility through formation of various institutional bodies for maintaining transparency and effective discharge of duties. Senior teachers have been made conveners of such committees and faculty from all sections has been included as members. Details are always given in the college prospectus and uploaded on college portal after due approval by the governing body. The governing body exercise general control and maintain governance of college. Plans and policies are finalized in the governing body which consists of representatives of all stakeholders. All the stakeholders are given due importance in planning and implementation of academic programs.

IQAC, considered as an important platform of an academic body has been instrumental in recommending and providing quality measures for overall growth of the institution. IQAC includes representative of government, university, teaching, non-teaching staff, alumni and from scientific community. All initiatives by the IQAC are in tune with holistic development of an individual and cumulative growth of an institution. Adopting a village to develop closer ties between an academic body and the community, signing MoU with industries and registered companies for creating/imparting job opportunities and skill development courses are a few notable recommendations by IQAC that were successfully implemented by the governing body of this college. Under inclusive practices, college assists the students in getting scholarships from government and other agencies.

To promote the importance of indoor sports like table tennis, a trainer has been appointed to coach young boys and girls from the adopted village apart from our own students. Yoga, meditation and martial arts are also conducted within the campus by competent bodies to bring harmony between mind and body of the students



during time of distress and agony. Best library users, toppers from each academic programme after final semester exams, best project on environmental issues, best sports person of the year, best non-teaching staff, are duly recognized by the college authority on college foundation day for their commendable performances. Convocation type ropes and attires are given to the winners on that eventful day to get them the feeling of achievers as witnessed for University pass out graduates.

Members of the research committee use digital softwares to check plagiarism and take effective measures to prevent infringement/violation of copyright acts. The college authority believes in honesty, sincerity and efficiency and never supports unlawful activities by any stakeholders.

A portal (<a href="http://www.abc.gov.in">www.abc.gov.in</a>) has been launched by Ministry of Education, Govt. of India where students can register themselves to earn and deposit credit. We welcome the change in the approaches of policy makers, which should help creating a common framework for the nation to take advantage of its demographic dividend. Our institution shall abide by the decision of the University of Calcutta (Affiliating University) and the Higher Education Department, West Bengal regarding the guidelines framed by them.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>The NEP-2020 envisioned for the holistic development of youth with emphasis on skill development as the main factor to make mission 'Self Reliant India' possible. College authority has already reached a Memorandum of Understanding with Anudip Foundation, Dhulagori, Howrah, for providing job oriented training, soft skills and language development courses [Certificate in Communicative English and IT (CEIT), duration three months] for final semester appearing and passed out students. Regarding skill development in Spoken Language and other programs like GPIS, our institution has a tie up with Indian Institute of Technology, Mumbai since 2019. In the academic year 2020-21, we have collaborated with Amrita Viswa Vidyapeetam University, Amritapuri campus, regarding training and conduct of Virtual Laboratory classes for science students. When offline practical classes were not possible during pandemic outbreak, experimental demonstration on virtual mode did help around 310 enrolled students in different science disciplines. Our college was also the nodal centre for conducting "PYTHON" computer program in collaboration with Spark Institute of Advanced Sciences, Calicut University, Kerala. In association with Entrepreneurship Development Institute of India (EDII) Ahmedabad and Department of Science and</p>

	<p>Technology and Biotechnology (DSTABT), West Bengal workshop and industry visit was organized to promote Entrepreneurship wisdom among our students. Our college has very recently collaborated with Dr. Reddy's Foundation for training and placement of differently-abled students. Spoken English course through Language Lab has been created by the department of English and Computer Science to enhance language proficiency skill of students through effective use of audio-visual tools. A special course has been introduced by Department of Sanskrit on Astanga-Yoga of Patanjali and practice of Meditation to enhance the skills of co-ordination between Body and Mind. This was introduced as add-on certificate course in 2022 when we realize the importance of mental health to overcome stressful situations. In the academic session 2022-23, understanding the relevance of NEP-2020 the college authority is focused to incorporate more skill development courses like Mushroom cultivation, Automotive Electric vehicle service technician, Media and Entertainment, Tourism and Hospitality management courses through Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikash Yojana (PMKVY 4.0).</p>

Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>Preservation and encouragement of India's cultural wealth must be considered a high priority for the country and it is truly important for the nation's identity as well. In this regard appropriate integration of the Indian Knowledge system particularly teaching in Indian languages is significant. In order to preserve and promote Indian culture, our institution has introduced Buddhist studies as Generic Elective subject for Post Graduate students of Bengali literature since 2020-21. Apart from state regional language and English language, much emphasis has been given to popularizing Sanskrit as media of teaching and learning. Subjects like Political science, History, Indian music are also offered to undergraduate students in order to inculcate sense of national integration, love for art &amp; music and develop civic sense among the student community. Efforts are on to collaborate Indian Music with the folklore of Bangladesh through cultural exchange programs. Subjects like Philosophy and Education in our course curriculum reflects different ancient schools and evolution of thought like Sankhya, Yoga, and Vedanta in Indian culture. Distance education/online education:	<p>The CBCS demands dissemination of knowledge within a time bound semesterized system to complete the syllabus as per lectures assigned for various modules in a lesson plan, UGC has recommended blended mode of teaching for educational institutes. Distance mode of education is another alternative specially for working personals to earn degree and certificates. #### 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

##### 1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

###### Response:

? The course curriculum to be followed in affiliated colleges as per University Statute is set by the parent university. Ramsaday college being affiliated to the University of Calcutta, the parent university designs the curriculum for all undergraduate and post graduate courses. The university has adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) since 2017 for B. Com and from 2018-19 academic session for B.A. and B.SC programmes. Apart from CBCS, annual system of examination for casual students continued till 2022.

? In skill enhancement course (SEC) and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) courses under CBCS, institutes have the freedom to choose topics as per requirement of the students and availability of trained teachers to deliver the lectures. Keeping in mind the future prospects and job opportunities, these courses were selected by the departments in a manner that will give them a distinct advantage in their future endeavour to higher education.

? For proper and effective implementation of the curriculum within the allotted time frame of academic calendar, the syllabus is distributed among the teachers according to the workload prescribed by academic bodies. Lesson plan and class routine is prepared accordingly before commencement of classes and is notified to the students through social platforms.

? After fifteen weeks duration of classes, semester exams are conducted as per schedule and guidelines of the University. The Board of studies of each subject frames the guidelines and passes necessary instructions for conducting exams and for evaluation processes. Most of the papers have three course components on which exams are conducted, namely Internal Assessment (IA), Tutorial or Practical (TU/PR) and Theoretical (TH). A student needs to secure the minimum pass percentage in each credit component for clearing a semester.

? Different genres of methods are adopted to add completeness to the education system. Though conventional chalk and talk method is mostly followed, teachers are also equipped with high end technical tools to add a distinct flavor in the teaching learning process.

? Regular departmental meetings are conducted to keep a systematic record of the activities planned and progress made by students. Students who lag behind are further enrolled in remedial classes to give them the much needed thrust and the confidence before semester exams.

? Even the deadly pandemic period that lasted for nearly eighteen months could not deter our efforts to plan and implement the course curriculum. Regular online classes were held as per structured class routine through effective use of digital platforms. Taking into consideration poor network connectivity in rural regions, class lessons in the form of e-materials were uploaded periodically by faculty members on college

portal. A virtual laboratory based training and demonstration was given to science students through effective collaboration with Amrita Viswa Vidyapeetham University. Self defense classes, health awareness programmes and academic related webinars were periodically conducted to boost the morale of students during the crisis period.

? All academic activities and outcomes are systematically documented in departmental log books and record registers.

## 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

### 1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

#### Response:

- The institution follows the curriculum framed by the parent University i.e, University of Calcutta. With the motto of *Tatparivartanam Bhav* (be the change you wish to see in the world) the institution strives to kindle the spirit of empathy, altruism and egalitarianism among the students. So, socially relevant issues, relating to human values, ethics, gender sensitivity, environmental sustainability are integrated in the teaching learning process within the purview of the syllabus.
- Students have to mandatorily undertake research projects on environmental issues like air and water pollution, biodiversity, utility of medicinal plants, water and waste management in AECC-2 (Environmental Studies).
- Skill Enhancement Courses are chosen by different departments with an emphasis on igniting the passion for building a fair, inclusive and sustainable society and on generating employability skills and global competencies. Rural Development, Climate Change, Resource Geography are some of such courses offered by Department of Geography keeping in mind several Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations. Food Safety & Quality Control, Food Preservation, Geriatric Nutrition are taught by Department of Food & Nutrition which are aimed at improving the quality of life and promoting the well being of the extended community. Papers on Apiculture, Aquarium Fish Keeping, Animal husbandry, Poultry Farming and Fish Technology, Medical Diagnosis are selected by Department of Zoology with the aim of promoting alternative livelihood opportunities for students, apart from instilling in them an insight into biodiversity and conservation of ecosystem around urban-nature interface. Pertinent issues, relating to environment, public health, bio-diversity etc and sustainable means of restoring the equilibrium, are given emphasis on field surveys undertaken by the students of the departments of Anthropology, Botany, Geography, Zoology.
- The institution believes in developing a strong rationale for critical thinking among the learners. So, instead of imposing moral theories on them, they are encouraged to air their views on human values in class and ethical dimensions are embedded in their tutorial and project topics, which are integral components of the curriculum. The Tutorial topics of Department of Philosophy include Moral Imperative of Ahimsa (Non-Violence) in day-to-day life and Current relevance of Jaina Ahimsa(Non-Violence). These help to deepen the understanding of Indian Ethics. The burning social problem of Female Foeticide has been included as one of the Tutorial topics of Department of English. The project topics of B.Com Honours students are selected to raise the awareness on social, financial and environmental concerns and instil the virtue of inclusivity. Projects are assigned on topics like public awareness and perception about CSR, Green Banking Initiatives, financial inclusion, social security measures; socio-economic conditions of the vulnerables like informal labours, zari & embroidery workers, potters, senior citizens etc. Gender Audit is also conducted by them in regular intervals to assess effectiveness of the gender mainstreaming measures adopted by the institution. The focal theme of project topics of Geography Honours students are chosen to assess the vulnerability faced by the local community and to suggest effective remedial measures for the same.

The institution, in such humble ways, is striving to be socially relevant to community, environment and of course to its greatest stakeholder, students.

## 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

### 2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

**Response:**

The College uses student centric methods, such as participative learning, experiential learning and problem-based learning for enhancing teaching learning process.

**Response:**

1. The class-room lectures are usually designed in interactive fashion. In particular students are asked to share any idea or thought that occurs to them in relation to the assigned topic. Also, science students are often asked to solve problems within the classroom using simple techniques. Student-seminars and quiz competition are being arranged in different departments to make students acquainted with latest developments. The College celebrates ‘Matribhasa Diwas’ on 21st February every year by arranging several activities like essay writing competition in their mother language, debate and singing competitions. Exhibition of science projects and models is organised to celebrate the National Science Day and students take the leading role in organising such programme. Thus, all levels of learners are encouraged to promote an environment of participative learning.

1. Social-awareness programmes, project-works and cultural programmes are regularly organised by the College in collaboration with the student council. Field works and excursions are especially frequent in streams like Political Science, Geography, Zoology, Botany and Anthropology. Field work experiences allow students to recapitulate and apply knowledge acquired in their classrooms.

Hands on laboratory experiments help the students to connect their theoretical knowledge to the real world and introduce a critical cultural aspect of science that all ideas need to be tested in a systematic manner. Through these kinds of experiential learning, students gain self-confidence and leadership skills and a better understanding of the course material.

1. To nurture the problem solving-skills of the students, real-world issues in their localities are often assigned. In particular, NSS volunteers of the College remain involved in a number of community service programmes over an academic year. They have actively participated in the medical camps, relief work to the flood affected people at remote villages in Amta and Udaynarayanpur, food and apparel distribution in hospitals and old age homes. In a problem-based learning project students collaborate with their classmates to find out a solution. This collaboration approach helps them to build skills like communication, compromise and listening. This is amply demonstrated in their role as volunteers during various NSS activities and as social messengers to conduct outreach activities in the adopted village. Students of Physical education department conduct Yoga and Bratachari classes at primary schools on routine basis to promote these sporting events among the young generation. Student representatives and class representatives play an important role in maintaining cordial academic atmosphere among all stakeholders.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

**2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient**

**Response:**

Continuous Internal Evaluation is an integral part of classroom teaching. As part of teaching- learning process, Internal evaluation is designed in such a way, that the students get prepared for their end semester examinations. In various departments, MCQ type Examination is conducted via Google Form. Students are also encouraged to submit field projects as part of experiential Learning tool.

The following methods are adopted as continuous assessment mechanism.

1. Class tests at regular intervals to determine the basic knowledge a student possess about the syllabus.
2. Viva voce conducted to assess their knowledge on practical subjects and project work completed.
3. Students are orally asked to give feedback on their problems, which are then discussed in the departmental meetings and suitable remedial measures are then undertaken to solve the problems.
4. Students, who seem to be irregular in class, are contacted via digital mode and their parents are asked to come and meet college authorities and guardians are made to answer for the irregularities of their wards.
5. In order to encourage students to be more participative in studies, students with good attendance records, are rewarded. Frequent library visitors are also rewarded based on their footfall.
6. Science departments are especially vigilant over students, who skip theory classes and come for practical classes. Students are allowed to do practical classes only if they have attended related theory classes.
7. Surprise tests are conducted periodically to hone the skills of the students. Students with weakness in studies are made to seat for Supplementary examinations, so that their shortcomings get sorted.

The students are monitored during class and they can come to a counselling room, dedicated for this purpose, to discuss and sort out their problems.

Students are constantly encouraged in every department to come up to respective teachers to get their assignments evaluated. In the form of student seminar, selected presentation and review articles are first edited by concerned teachers and then published in college academic journal. Students during pandemic period often sent answers in pdf format to get them checked. Students were then called over phone and their mistakes were corrected. The practice of attending to students' need via digital mode, is kept in continuous practice even in post pandemic teaching- learning process.

The students who are generally first generation learners often make mistake during filling up admission forms, scholarship application or Calcutta University examination forms. In most cases the academic committee handles and solves the matter by addressing letters to the controller or registrar section. The college has efficient staff members to handle examination related issues within stipulated time and in rare cases students or their guardians need to visit or knock the university doors for solution. Apart from above mentioned benevolent services provided to students, they have the freedom to submit their grievances, if any, through both online and offline mechanisms without disclosing their identity.

## 2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

### 2.6.1 Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and attainment of POs and COs are evaluated

#### Response:

Undergraduate (UG) Program : Three year revised annual system under (I+I+I yearly programme) for both Honours and General was introduced in 2009 by the University of Calcutta and continued till 2017. Semesterized system under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has been introduced for B.Com programs since July 2017 and for Arts and Science streams in 2018-19 academic session. Our institution at present conducts 44 academic Programmes under CBCS in all three streams of Arts, Science and Commerce.

Postgraduate (PG) program : The institution conducts two year regular post graduate program in Bengali under University of Calcutta since July 2016. As an affiliated college under the University of Calcutta, the degree is been awarded by the University while admission and exam related matters were conducted by the institution study centers since 2016. From 2018 onwards, CBCS has been introduced in the Master's program as well and admission is conducted through centralized online system by the university. Setting of question papers and evaluation of scripts are also done by the University since 2018. Students who clear the semester exams (four exams over a span of two years) get the Master's degree in Arts and are eligible for doctoral research programs as per UGC guidelines.

**Course Outcomes:**

The laboratory based Programmes have three components namely Internal Assessment (IA), Practical (PR) and Theoretical (TH). Theoretical component has 4 and the practical component 2 credits in each paper of 100 marks weightage. Non-lab based subjects also have three components- IA, Tutorial (TU) and Theoretical. Each Theory and Tutorial course has 5 and 1 credit(s) respectively. Semester wise courses for B.A/B.Sc and B.Com honours have total 140 credits and B.A., B.Sc and B.Com. general programmes have 120 credits( six semesters of 20 credits each). A student of honours has to study apart from core courses (CC), generic elective courses (GE) in two different subjects other than the honours subject and Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC-1 and 2) in first two semesters. One can choose Communicative English or any modern Indian language from AECC-1 and Environmental studies as compulsory paper in AECC-2. In remaining four semesters, a student apart from core courses of honours subject has to study skill enhancement (SEC) and Discipline specific elective (DSE) courses. The departments decide about the courses from several options considering the facilities and resources available at their end and most importantly the scope and opportunities these course outcomes will have on pass out graduates. The course and program outcomes are then uploaded on college website for public view. At the end of each academic year, students have the freedom to share their views and opinions through feedback forms which are analysed and scrutinized by the academic committee.

The decision of the academic committee is first discussed in the IQAC and is placed before the governing body for final approval.

### 3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

**3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge**

**Response:**

The College has created a nurturing ecosystem for Research and Innovation by developing efficient human resource and initiating methodical and structured dissemination of knowledge. The details are given below.

- **Human Resource Development:** The faculty members of the College regularly up-grade themselves through participation in national, international and state-level seminars, workshops and conferences. Financial support and leave are provided to attend these academic events. A project fellowship scheme has been launched by the College which aimed at providing research support to State Aided College Teachers in undertaking socially relevant active research projects and the outcome of the research projects are published in the college academic journal “BUDHIL”. The college has a valid membership of N-LIST to facilitate the online access of learning resources to the registered students and faculties.
- **Research and Collaborations:** The College has several academic collaborations with institutions both at the state and the national levels. In the academic year 2020-21, the Institution has collaborated with Amrita Viswa Vidyapeetham University, regarding training and conduct of Virtual Laboratory classes for science students. Also, the college was the nodal centre for conducting PYTHON Coding Course in collaboration with Spark Institute of Advanced Sciences,

Calicut University, Kerala in 2021. The institution has also registered its name in the Spoken Tutorial Project conducted by IIT Bombay through MOOC programs. In 2019, the department of Geography has participated in one such programme, Remote Sensing-Global Positioning System that has given students an opportunity to understand the basic operational modes of GPS. In addition, the teachers are in different collaborative research programmes with other institutes like IEST, Shibpur, University of Calcutta etc.

- **Ecosystem for Innovations and Entrepreneurship:** The College has been in an untiring pursuit to nurture, encourage and inspire the students by supporting them with new ideas and innovative projects. An incubation centre, “Prayashee” has been established in 2022 to enable the young students for meaningful and rewarding careers. The College has signed the MOU with Anudip Foundation for providing soft skill training to the interested students. College also organize Entrepreneurship Awareness Camp in every year in association with EDI.
- **Transfer of Knowledge:** Students are trained in writing and presenting research papers/review article and posters that would shape them as future scholars or writers. The teachers as well as the students are encouraged to submit research articles and writings in the college journal “Budhil” (ISSN: 2456-4109). Multiple departments of the college regularly publish both wall and printed magazines. Through these creative pursuits specialized skills are nurtured among the young generation. The College offers English language laboratory based effective English crash course with an objective to listen, speak, write and adapt the foreign language.
- **Community Orientation:** Several social awareness programmes like Swaccha Bharat., Digital money Transaction Awareness Program, Thalassaemia screening camp, Blood donation camp, free eye-testing camp have been conducted to integrate academic and community services. Whenever need arises during cyclonic storms that lash the gangetic plain, NSS volunteers ably guided by nodal officers are the first to reach the flood victims with relief materials to erase their distress and agony.

### 3.4 Extension Activities

**3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.**

**Response:**

The mission of our institution is to ensure complete quality holistic education at both undergraduate and post-graduate levels. The students organize and participate in various social programmes to help the community enjoy a better life and live in healthy environment.

The NSS unit of the college, actively led by three Programme Officers, plans and executes various socially relevant events. The college authority takes pride to see spontaneous and widespread participation of students not only in college related activities but in outreach programmes that binds the academic institution with the community.

Among the various programmes undertaken during last five years, notable ones have been given below:

Voluntary Blood Donation Camps by students and staff.

Eye Testing Camp for elderly people and cataract operation at renowned medical institutes with no charge claimed from the patients.

Health Awareness Camps among children and elderly people.

Environment-Awareness rally and setting up rain water harvesting unit in the adopted village of Madaria.

Awareness camps, such as " LOUKIK AND ALOUKIK" to eradicate superstitions from the minds of the villagers.

Execution of cleaning programmes at the adjacent locality and at public places as part of Swachchata mission.

Afforestation and save greenery programme within campus and outside.

Thalassaemia awareness camps in collaboration with Tropical Medicine of Calcutta.

Besides organizing and sensitizing the community about prioritizing blood test to detect Thalassemia, before marriage, the parents were given appropriate counseling, necessary thereof.

The College also took up the challenge of arranging **COVID 19 VACCINATION CAMPS** within the Campus between October 2021 to April 2022. 4041 heads were vaccinated in the camps. The local community benefitted highly from this timely project. To combat with the pandemic situation college had **donated rupees two lakhs to the West Bengal State Emergency Relief Fund.**

**Prof Asmita Banerjee** of the Department of Sociology, Ramsaday College, throughout the raging period of Covid pandemic, tirelessly helped Covid positive patients by arranging free hospital beds, food and the life-saving Oxygen cylinders.



**Asmita** also arranged a unique rally in the International Kolkata Book Fair 2022 for the **Rights of the Visually Impaired** persons by walking blindfolded with them to spread the message of Empathy. She had with her in this endeavour the support of students from various universities.

Ramsaday College has tirelessly extended its services through its NSS volunteers to help the victims of innumerable natural calamities that had hit this part of rural Bengal. NSS team along with its Programme Officers distributed dry food, drinking water, medicine to flood-affected and Amphan hit residents.

NSS Unit along with the College Students' Union also arranged "**SAVE THE RIVER**" programme to make the students as well as local people aware of the role of river in the sustenance of rural development.

The Students' council without fail arranges cultural programmes to commemorate national events and on occasions of Freshers' welcome, farewell for the outgoing batch, as well as Teachers' Day and Basanta Utsav. The programmes help students of the college to showcase their talent. The local residents and villagers eagerly wait to become part of such memorable events that give them the chance to witness live performance of celebrities.

## Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

### 4.1 Physical Facilities

#### 4.1.1 Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities, cultural activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

##### Response:

Ramsaday college is well equipped to offer quality education at UG and PG levels. The college building has two parts clearly distinguishable by their colour contours, a heritage part (1946-1976) and a portion constructed in the nineties and thereafter. At present it has 40 fully functional class rooms and 12 well equipped laboratories to ensure smooth conduct of academic activities. Out of 40 classrooms, 8 have been upgraded with wall mount projectors, white and green boards, internet connection and public address system to make them ICT enabled. The entire campus has wi fi facilities from JIO connectivity. The eight science departments have separate blocks to carry out their departmental activities. Apart from these, lush green landscape, flower gardens, open spaces, clean water bodies provide a congenial environment for academic pursuits.

? The college has a separate post graduate Bengali department with three assigned class rooms and a separate research laboratory that houses sophisticated instruments purchased from UGC/DST grants.

? A fully functional automated library of approximately 3500 square feet area accommodates over 26000 text and reference books, over 400 journals and separate reading zones for students and faculty. The library has internet and reprography facilities and is under CCTV surveillance. Apart from the central library, departments have their own libraries created from specimen copies and books donated by alumni members.

? A well decorated auditorium with seating capacity of 200 is situated at the second floor of Vivekananda bhawan and has very recently been upgraded with air-conditioned facilities.

? the college office which is air-conditioned has separate blocks for cash section, accounts, server room, head clerk's room, store room, working place and scholarship section. All processes have been streamlined to minimize waiting period for beneficiaries.

? College has multi gym facilities and open spaces for physical exercise and NCC activities.

? There is a hostel at Madaria village almost 2 kms from college campus. Rain water harvesting unit at the hostel not only saves water but spreads the message of water conservation for sustainable development.

? Annual college sports and social functions are held every year in the adjacent college play ground. There is a separate enclosure for herbal garden and vermi-composting technique and a weather station for monitoring weather related parameters. All measuring devices have been calibrated by the Indian Metereological department to ensure error free forecasts.

? College has separate boys' and girls' common room with indoor sports facilities. The girls' common room has sanitary napkin vending machine and an incinerator maintained exclusively by student representatives.

?There are ramps and handrails in several areas, divyangan toilet, Braille fitted tiles as signage, screen reading software and device for specially challenged and visually impaired students.

? There is a waiting room for visitors and a guest room for outstation staff wishing to stay within the campus.

?Two subsidized canteens with food courts operate during college hours to ensure supply of food and beverages for staff and students. The solid waste from these canteens are collected periodically and processed into organic compost.

? There are fire extinguishers and smoke alarm devices at several strategic points as part of disaster management step.

## 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

#### 4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), subscription to e-resources, amount spent on purchase of books, journals and per day usage of library

**Response:**

A well equipped library is considered the epitome of any academic institution. It is the store house of knowledge that nourishes the staff and students equally as per their requirements and needs. Since our

institution is situated on the embankments of river Damodar and the thought what the inundated area could cause to the library situated on the ground floor of the heritage building, the college governing body in 2005 shifted it to first floor of Acharya Prafulla Chandra Ray building. At present the library (covered space around 3500 sq. Ft. area) has one stack area, librarian's cabin and area for housekeeping operations, 26000+ books, 2000+ volumes of journals and magazines, 8 computers which are connected with high-speed internet through LAN, 2 Printers, 1 Xerox, 2 Scanners, 1 barcode printer, 1 hand-held scanner, 1 digital notice board and two CCTV for 24x7 surveillance of library activities. There is an air-conditioned annexe room for reading purpose.

The Central Library is automated with the latest version of Koha software. The first installation of this software dates back to 2014 which has been upgraded at regular intervals with latest versions. The cataloguing process has been done through the ILMS and automated issue and return of books have commenced from 2018. Some rare books of M.N. Roy Collection, faculty publications and previous year question papers are kept in the Institutional repository (IR) for internal uses. IR was developed by latest version of DSPACE software and is monitored periodically. We take pride to announce that all upgradation work using available free software are done indigenously with no outsourcing whatsoever.

The Central Library provides free access to e-resources of NDL developed by IIT Kharagpur and INFLIBNET-NLIST. Library also contributes to OAR database (WBCOLOR) developed by West Bengal college librarians and provide free access to the students and faculties. Users can enjoy facility of reading and downloading e-books and e-journals through 'NLIST' programme of INFLIBNET, WBCOLOR or any other OA databases. Periodic subscriptions are made from college fund to keep the facilities active.

Other services provided through library include information regarding new arrival of books, Journal and magazines, notifications related to job vacancies or admission in higher studies, photocopying facility, Internet surfing from designated terminals or from personal gadgets using library Wi-Fi. Library facility is also open to the ex-students preparing for higher studies or competitive examinations. Users can enjoy virtual tour of different Indian tourist attractions and can have the pleasure reading and downloading the e-version story books as well as text books from the custom search engine which was indigenously developed and integrated to our library website. A Facebook page is also maintained by the library to alert users about introduction of new services or upcoming college events.

Approximately 30 to 35 footfalls daily to the library for reading and lending purpose have been recorded. To encourage our students about effective library use, 'Indrajit Bakshi best library user award' is given every year and students are trained periodically about OPAC and e-resource searching techniques.

### 4.3 IT Infrastructure

#### 4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

**Response:**

- The college has created adequate IT facilities in the campus to meet the demands of the present situation. At present the institution is equipped with 113 computers, 29 printers (including Xerox machine), 11 Projectors (wall mount and portable), 3 Digital Display Board, 1 Portable Sound System. Most of the departments have computer(s) with internet facility along with necessary software. Computer Science, Geography, Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics maintain separate computer laboratory for their academic needs. Internet bandwidth varies from 100 mbps to 35 mbps. The entire campus area is covered under Reliance Jio Network Wi Fi. Regular maintenance of the computers and accessories are done by local vendor Service Media.
- To support the blended mode of teaching learning process, college has developed 8 smart classrooms equipped with wall-mount Projectors, Display Screens, Broadband/WiFi, Public address System. One graphic Tablet with stylus is also available to support online mode of teaching.
- College office and different support departments have computers with LAN facilities for effective academic and administrative work.
- Different academic departments and office are using specialized software for academic and administrative works, these are:
  - Mathematics uses C, C++, LATEX, software operating programs.
  - Physics uses Python, Gnuplot, ORIGIN, Avogadra and have conducted online training program on Python course for others at national level.
  - Geography uses QGIS, R and has embedded barcode for online retrieval of departmental magazine, routine and related information.
  - English department uses Orell-Pro Language Lab for Communicative English courses.
  - Office uses DBMS based software, **Student Plus** (offline) and **Campus Expert** (online) for student data management and Finaware-ERP for accounting purpose.
- Departments, especially during and post covid period, are using Google meet, Webex, Microsoft team like digital platforms for conducting online classes.
- Library is automated with Koha software since 2014. Library also uses DSPACE digital library software for archiving of old books, university's Question paper etc. Library provides support of Zotero and Mendeley software for referencing of scholarly publications of faculty members. Library provides access of NLIST and WBCOLOR database to the students and faculty.
- The college runs customized portal of online admission and fees collection. All fees collection is done through internet banking and Bill Desk system.
- College website has a separate platform for E-resources which are open to all and accessible remotely.
- Different notice links, e-resources, activities, e-tendering are uploaded on college website and the portal is regularly maintained by JPPIO.
- Quick heal or Kaspersky has been installed in most of the computers and updated regularly.
- College authority follows no paper wastage policy and all important news, notices are displayed digitally.
- The entire college is covered under CCTV Surveillance and is monitored from the Principal's room. The back up record is available for 15 days in the main frame server. Among different online portals those that are regularly used for administrative purposes are

Institution's effort is to implement a mentor-mentee relationship management tool to help new entrants get in touch with experienced alumni willing to share their expertise and best practices in a given field. Senior alumni might as well be willing to learn new skills from their junior counterparts. This collaborative effort on administrative part will definitely bear fruit for all involved and glorify the institution. Our distinguished list of alma mater comprises of Vice Chancellors, faculty members holding prominent position in universities and other academic bodies, medical professionals, play writers, sports personnel to members in state legislative assemblies. Due to lack of student database then at our end, it has become increasingly difficult to retrieve the contacts and whereabouts of most of our alumni members who have donned prominent academic or administrative positions in the past. Departments have become effective after IQAC formation to create their own student profile and take constructive measures to revive relationship with the previous batches. Donation of books to central and departmental libraries, conduct of skill development classes, sharing experiences of cracking competitive exams like NET/SET, forwarding news of job prospects and opportunities for imminent graduates using digital platforms and donation in cash or kind are some of the notable works by the alumni that immensely benefitted this institution.

### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

**Response:**

Set in the latitudes and longitudes of Amta, Ramsaday College was established in the year 1946 by Shri Panchanan Chongdar who envisioned the dream of setting up a suitable framework to impart proper education to the semi-urban residents. The geographical distance and conveyance hardship, undoubtedly shoved their dreams light years away from achieving the desired 'escape velocity'. Establishment of this college was visioned with the mission to render to them the light of Education, opportunities and the desired flow of life. The college is dedicated to spread 'the utility of Education' to people who are deprived to even cherish the basic necessities of life.

The education system has paved way towards the basic right of knowledge, thus bringing a massive shift from elitist ostracism. Adhering to this line of teaching, the college caters to uplift the educational and moral values to learners, many of them even the lone torch-bearers of education in their families. The college initially started with a handful of students. Today, however, smelling the success of achievement, every corner of the college echoes the cheerful laughter of students. To house increasing number of students, a new Gitanjali building overlooking the peaceful pond has been developed. It is delightful to observe the huge number of female students, reflecting the dream of the founder towards women empowerment.

We aim to make our college a center of quality learning shaping our students into responsible citizens by imparting to them the necessities of material and moral education. Apart from the vast genre of academic courses, there are also vocational trainings to aid the students in achieving their desired spectra of dreams.

Special care is taken to ensure that lack of proper financial ability does not keep any child away from the light of education. The college takes care to ensure that proper education is obtained without any extra burden on the family of the student.

Different programmes are organized throughout the year which bring about unity, harmony and exchange of thoughts among the students from different departments and also encourage collaborative thinking with the loving guidance of the teachers.

The college has always keen eyes to provide all-round development of a student. Even when jeopardized with the 'Online Education', other than fixed schedules of regular online classes, various other initiatives were taken to hold the attention and interest of the students to the best of their well-being. Various webinars and certified courses were held to suitably build a student's domain of knowledge in required arena. The practical-based Science subjects missing the hands-on flavor of experiments, students were even able to get the test-tube touch virtually on collaboration of the college with Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham.



Utmost care is always taken to nourish the interests of the students so that they can always relentlessly spread their wings high in pursuit to achieve their desired zones of interest and are thus able to acquire those fruits which they have been forever deprived of.

## 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

### 6.2.1 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc

#### Response:

The college authority firmly believes in decentralization of responsibility through formation of various institutional bodies for maintaining transparency and effective discharge of duties. Senior teachers have been made conveners of such committees and faculty from all sections has been included as members. Details are always given in the college prospectus and uploaded on college portal after due approval by the governing body.

IQAC, considered as an important platform of an academic body has been instrumental in recommending and providing quality measures for overall growth of the institution. All initiatives by the IQAC are in tune with holistic development of an individual and cumulative growth of an institution. Adopting a village to develop closer ties between an academic body and the community, signing MoU with industries and registered companies for creating/imparting job opportunities and skill development courses are a few notable recommendations by IQAC that were successfully implemented by the governing body of this college. Effective functioning of admission and examination committees can be amply demonstrated by the fact that not a single case of complain or grievance has been registered for several years as all seats approved by the parent university are filled based only on merit and maintaining the reservation policies of the government of India. After special drive for reserved seats, vacant seats, if any, are de-reserved with permission from the Backward class department and admission is made thereafter on merit basis only.

The games and sports committee led by teachers of the physical education department make the institution proud every year by bagging several laurels in inter-college, district and state level competitions. As recommended by the committee, deserving students are provided all sorts of assistance and encouraged to pursue a successful career in the field of sports. To promote the importance of indoor sports like table tennis, a trainer has been appointed to coach young boys and girls from the adopted village apart from our own students. Yoga, meditation and martial arts are also conducted within the campus by competent bodies to bring harmony between mind and body of the students during time of distress and agony.

Teachers are not only encouraged to submit research proposals to sanctioning bodies like UGC/CSIR/DST but are supported financially from college own grant after screening of project proposals. Members of the research committee use digital softwares to check plagiarism and take effective measures to prevent infringement/violation of copyright acts. The college authority believes in honesty, sincerity and efficiency and never supports unlawful activities by any stakeholders.

The toughest challenge is however faced by the placement cell to hire recruiting agencies or companies for providing jobs to potential seekers immediately after graduation. The placement committee has however

formed an agreement with agencies like Anudip soft skill provider (since 2019) and Edubridge Inc (from 2021) for conducting skill oriented classes and with Maple Accessories Pvt Ltd (since 2019) as an industry partner. Female entrepreneurs are specially encouraged, trained and motivated under our institute banner “PRAYASHI”. Computer Assisted language training classes are conducted in small batches to develop English vocabulary among students. Despite several hardships, the effort and high spirit of the committee members deserves all praise for their commendable achievements as evidenced from placement records and student satisfaction survey.

## 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

### 6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

**Response:**

1. Ramsaday College Provident Fund exists for teaching and non-teaching staff who are on substantive posts. It follows the general scheme recommended by the Government Provident Fund Scheme. The PF Committee tries its level best to handover the PF cheque to the incumbent within 3 months after retirement and also to staff who apply for loan from PF after approval by the governing body.
2. Group Insurance Policy for full time teaching and non-teaching staff: this is an insurance scheme that follows the Life Insurance Policy Scheme, whereby an employee can get maximum benefit with minimum contribution.
3. Ramsaday College Teachers' Council (TC): All faculty members are subscribers of this body with nominal contribution as TC subscription. The teachers' council always extends support in the form of unconditional and instant donation to teachers and non-teaching staff who face emergency financial problems. There are instances in which families were provided financial assistance due to untimely demise of teaching or non-teaching member to overcome the period of crisis.
4. Ramsaday College Staff Welfare Fund was formed in the year 2008. For any kind of financial

crisis, the Welfare Fund can provide a loan of maximum 2.5 lakhs to a member at interest not more than the existing market rate. A dedicated bank account is there with teachers approved by the teachers' council have operational rights.

5. The College gives festival advance to the SACT teachers and non-teaching staff, with amounts as approved by the governing body which they need to repay in equal monthly instalments.
6. Ramsaday College Research Grant has been initiated from the 2016-17 academic session to promote research among faculty members. Seven Part time teachers were provided research grants to the extent of Rs.25000 each as approved by the research committee and also in 2022, eight state aided college teachers were provided financial grants based on proposals submitted.
7. The College provides travelling allowance /registration fees to teachers / non-teaching staff for attending seminars/ conferences/ workshops within the country. Certificate of participation and or presentation should accompany the fees claimed for reimbursement.
8. Since 2017, employee of the year award is conferred to a non-teaching staff which is selected by IQAC based on attendance, performance and character.

All teaching staff need to fill up the performance based self appraisal reports at completion of every academic year and the reports are preserved for future reference. The Governing Body reviews the overall reports and suggestions made therein and analyses the strength and weakness of the institute.

## 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

**6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)**

**Response:**

The institution strives for holistic development of the students and tries to augment its financial, infrastructural and human resources towards maximisation of benefits to the students as well as other stakeholders.

- The College has a Planning Board, Finance, Building and Purchase Committee, Library and various associated bodies under the aegis of the Governing Body which help in the decision making process regarding mobilization, allocation and utilization of funds from authorities such as UGC, State government, West Bengal Higher Education Department (WBHED), RUSA, MPLad, Department of Science and Technology. Annual Budget is prepared by the Department of Economics in collaboration with the Accounts Department which is placed before the Governing Body with prior recommendation of the Finance Committee.
- All purchases are done through a tender system to maintain fairness and transparency of the process. The accounts are maintained using a customised software. The financial statements are

reviewed by External Auditor at the end of each financial year.

- The ground floor of Geetanjali Building has been constructed from RUSA fund which is subsequently expanded using WBHED fund. The college fund has been used to construct 4 classrooms to cater the dire need of classrooms to accommodate over 5000 students studying 44 programmes. A separate guest room has been created for outstation teachers. The playing arena has been linked to the main road via the second approach road to college campus. Scattered land has been exchanged with neighbours for minimisation of vacant unapproachable space. The aim of optimal use of each and every corner of the college has not hindered conservation of natural resources (Approx 70% of green coverage and 2 water bodies).
- Use of technological advancement for up-gradation of teaching-learning environment is achieved by creation of 8 smart classrooms including 1 virtual classroom all equipped with internet connections.
- With limited scope for geographical expansion, necessary steps are taken for augmentation of infrastructure and human resources to cater the needs and aspirations of the students and other stakeholders. Use of flexible infrastructure like portable LED Projector, portable speaker, graphic tablets ensure availability of ICT enabled environment to the maximum students.
- Green Campus Committee looks after the sustainability measures such as recycling of e-wastes, curtailment in use of plastic, water ATM etc. Water conservation unit has been installed in Girls' Hostel by the Departments of Geography and Environmental Studies where rainwater harvesting is done for groundwater recharging and use of excess water for day to day chores such as washing utensils and garments.
- Free Scholarship are provided to financially weak students (Both UG and PG courses) to encourage the spirit of equitable growth for all.
- Assistance to teachers for capacity building and research activities are provided. Research projects of SACTs are sponsored from college fund.
- Facilities are often shared by different departments. The Soil Testing Laboratory is shared by the Departments of Chemistry, Environmental Studies and Geography. After successful completion of Minor Research Projects, the equipments purchased from these grants are used for providing hands on training to the students.

Healthy contacts between teachers and students, good interactions between campus and community are our strength.

- ? Helped in providing karate practice mats and protective gadgets to students who had enrolled for self-defence classes.
- ? Helped to organize vaccination camps in the Post-Pandemic period within the college premises, in collaboration with the local hospital.
- ? Actively supported organization of Medical camps in the adopted village for elderly people, specially, women.
- ? Sit and draw competition for primary school students and table tennis training for students of age group 7-12.
- ? Sanitary napkin vending machine and incinerators at the girls' common room.

The third practice has been paying proper attention to students' grievances.

Action was taken to address grievance of the students of paying for courses they pursued in the first two semesters only. It was ensured that their excess fees were refunded and no charges for remaining semesters.

The fourth practice has been the signing of MOUs.

Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham armed the Science disciplines of the college with the domain of Virtual Laboratories. Ramsaday College becoming only the second Institution in West Bengal to be their nodal center. During the pandemic period by virtue of this programme, students got the flavour of experimental facilities, sitting right in their homes.

Different workshops were held on programming languages like Python to hone the computational skills of the students. In collaboration with IIT Bombay Spoken Tutorial platform, students got the opportunity to be trained in different domains. They also received certificates on successful completion of the course.

The fifth practice has been of taking regular feedback from students in order to keep abreast with their problems. The practice was continued, even in the pandemic period.

#### 7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity and Institutional initiatives to celebrate / organize national and international commemorative days, events and festivals during the last five years

##### Response:

The institution is committed towards adherence of principles of Fundamental Rights as laid down in the Indian Constitution. Several measures have been adopted with an aim of honouring gender equality and mainstreaming the girl students has been a keystone during policy formulation.

- The notion of equal opportunities is practiced in admission and recruitment process. Both the canteens are managed by female cuisinier. The freedom of expression is pursued in all sphere with female representative(/s) in every committee as also in Students' Union. All female students are encouraged to join NCC (girl's wing) and self defence classes are conducted to boost their confidence and imbibe the mechanism of self protection during times of adversities.
- Safe and secure environment for the students have been ensured by 24x7 presence of security-guards, checking of photo identity cards of students at college entrance, separate common room for girl students with sanitary napkin vending machine and incinerator. IQAC has recommended recruitment of female security-guards during college hours. The Girls' Hostel provides safe and homely atmosphere for outstation girl students.
- The college strictly adheres to the policy of zero tolerance; installation of CCTV surveillance and formation of dedicated Internal Complaints Committee and Grievance Redressal Cell for addressing the concerns of girl students on campus are some of the endeavours for accomplishment of such policy.
- Gender Audit is conducted among all internal stakeholders of the institution at regular interval. More female support staff have been recruited based on the feedback received from such survey.
- The institution believes that financial independence is a weapon to overcome social barriers & stop early marriage. Skill development programmes are conducted and Start Up Incubation Centre has been formed to enable students to learn employable skills and channelize their potential natural talents into means of livelihood.
- Gender Sensitization Programmes are conducted to raise the awareness of all stakeholders and NSS units arrange special camps relating to Save Girl Child and health programme for children and women.

The institution also strives for promotion of spirit of tolerance, brotherhood and harmony among the students. Observation of various important days of national and international relevance is one such initiative towards the attainment of the goal.

- National Days such as National Youth Day (Birthday of Swami Vivekananda), Birthday of Netaji (Parakram Divas), Republic Day and Independence Day are celebrated where students, teachers and staff convey their perspective of such occasions, pay homage to the leaders and NCC and NSS Cadets perform drills and parade.
- Saraswati Puja, Biswa Nabi Divas, International Mother Language Day and Raksha Bandhan are observed to respect the dignity of multi-culturalism.



- On the occasions of International Yoga Day, World Sanskrit Day, National Science Day, World Environment Day, Earth Day, Entrepreneurship Day etc the relevance of such particular day are communicated and the students take part in processions, poster presentations, demonstrations and tree plantation.
- Cultural programmes by the students are organised on Basanta-Utsav (celebration of spring), Rabindra Jayanti, Annual Function.
- Convocation of best-performing students is arranged on Foundation Day (1st August) to extend a feeling of achievement as well as motivating existing students to perform better. Clothes and food are distributed among the vulnerables on such occasion.

All these are directed towards making the students socially responsible with reverence towards the sanctity of humanity.

**Response:**

This institution believes in equality among diversities and committed to holistic growth of the students and to the society at large. The institute has taken various initiatives for providing an inclusive environment and promoting tolerance, harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal, socio-economic and other diversities.

- Institution is very much concerned and takes every possible step to see that no student leaves midway because of financial constraints to pursue further studies. All sorts of counselling, benevolent services to differently abled students and remedial coaching for the academically weaker ones are done to reduce the drop-out rates. Hostel facilities are also offered from the college authority for rural girl students. These initiatives are to promote better education, economic uplift of the disadvantaged section of the society.
- To build a Nation, development in each and every aspect of a village is decisive. Village adoption and to improve services in health and education for the villagers is a landmark decision by IQAC in 2017. Environmental awareness programmes and Medical Camps are systematically organized by recognized bodies, ably supported by the NSS volunteers under guidance of program officers. Door to door campaigning is followed to prevent malpractices and improve awareness on sanitation, hygiene, waste management and water conservation. Growing along with the community is the prime focus of the institution as we believe in sharing and dissemination of knowledge rather than confinement of education within the four walls of a classroom.
- Our dynamic NSS and NCC Units are involved in regular cleanliness drives under Swacchata program for creating a better workplace to live and thrive. NSS volunteers also organize blood donation camps, free eye-testing camp, save girl child and road safety campaign, greenery and water conservation programs within and outside the college campus. Along with Teaching and non-teaching staff, NSS volunteers extend their helping hands to distribute relief materials in flood affected areas whenever situation demands.
- Institution pays special emphasis to programmes that involve women empowerment. Self defence classes have been introduced to boost their confidence and to train them to take this martial art as one of their career options. Besides that, special emphasis is given to train students through soft skill development courses and to enhance their language vocabulary power so as to brighten their employment opportunities. Teachers from various departments form a cordial environment for effective discharge of responsibilities. College also provides opportunities to promote entrepreneurial wisdom among the students. All stakeholders including the Alumni do take an important part in creating an inclusive environment.
- Teachers, staff and students unitedly celebrate the cultural and regional festivals like Basanta Utsava, Raksha Bandhana, National Youth Day, Yoga Day, Republic Day, Teachers' Day, Independence Day, College foundation Day, World Environment Day, Women Entrepreneurs' Day and so on. Saraswati puja and Biswa Nabi Diwas are celebrated with equal enthusiasm by the student community. Special emphasis is given to sporting events like Kho-Kho, Kabadi and Bratachari that promote team spirit and unity of mind and body.

## 7.2 Best Practices

### 7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

#### Response:

Traditionally, the college always had a scholarly faculty ably supported by the stakeholders in formulating and discharging policies for the moral and academic uplift of students. It has a set of highly motivated teachers, many of whom are involved in active research and Post-Graduate teaching as guest lecturers at various universities. Some faculty members have taken up advanced research projects in collaboration with other universities and reputed institutes.

High success rate in undergraduate courses has enabled large number of students to pursue further studies at various Universities and research institutes. All the faculty members provide academic counseling to their students through structured routine for which separate counseling cubicles have been made in the library & Teacher's room. Involvement of students outside class hours in various clubs like Music and drama, Painting and Photography, Journalism, Save Nature and natural habitats, NCC (for Girls), Sports and fitness, NSS (Three units) under the leadership of nodal and program officers create holistic development of participants.

Two of the notable achievements the college authority feels fit to highlight to justify its relentless effort in expansion of higher education among the rural community have been illustrated below.

#### Women enrolment and empowerment;

Since its very inception way back in 1946 with a meager 47 students (all male students), the college has gradually expanded its academic horizon with periodic inclusion of contemporary programmes and value added courses to incorporate the flavor and utility of modern era education in the teaching learning process. With 44 academic programmes and over 96 choice based subject combinations offered to our students, the utility of choice based credit system (CBCS) has been fully explored. The traditional concept or belief that a female child is a burden to her parents and the society at large, has now been relinquished as evidenced from gradual increase in enrolment of female students in various academic programmes.

The astounding figure of over 65% female enrolment every session for past six to seven years has prompted the college authority to renovate the infrastructure to suit their demands and purposes. With enrolment not a problem now, the drop out rate among female students after marriage (as soon as they attain the age of eighteen years) is a genuine concern that needs to be addressed. Here lies the importance of village adoption and regular career counseling programmes that we feel have given us the scope and an alternative pathway to reach to our students and also to their parents. The sample survey from our adopted village Madaria, under Sirajbati village panchayat, has revealed that the drop out rate due to early marriage is almost zero for three consecutive years after massive campaign and counseling programmes undertaken by our stakeholders. Various benevolent and outreach activities extended to the village community and even organization of adult education classes at their end have proved beneficial in winning their confidence and establishing the truth that a female child is a boon and blessing to our society. We need to empower a

girl child to have a healthy and productive society. Empowerment of girl students through 'Prayashi', entrepreneurial programme, is a new venture that will strengthen our mission of accomplishing the goal.

Thrust on sporting activities:

Swami Vivekananda's thought of developing a nation through inheritance of beautiful body and mind has been our source of inspiration that metamorphosed our outlook to developing sporting events for younger generation. We are indeed lucky to have a dedicated pool of teachers in our Physical Education department who dare to lead from the front to set up examples for their wards. A well equipped gymnasium set up with financial assistance from UGC XI period grant and regular work up under strict vigilance of teachers have created sports persons who excel at various college, district and state level competitions. Girls' NCC wing under ANO LT Moushumi Garai and the girls' karate wing (enrolled under self defense programme) under supervision of Sensei Moushumi Pal Majumder have brought laurels that not only inspire the upcoming generation of students but create plethora of job opportunities for the existing ones. Two of our students are now involved in training the women wing of Kolkata police under 'Tejaswini' programme. Students of Physical Education department give free coaching classes on Yoga to primary students of the region. The college authority has extended the services of free gym use (once weekly) to children of age group 7-14 from the local community and also free table tennis training to children under the watchful eyes of Sri Netai Chandra Saha, a trainer from Jadavpur University, Kolkata. The aim is to groom them to become competent players who will represent state and national events in future from this region.

## 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

### 7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

#### Response:

Every programme of study in this institution lends itself to the well structured and sequenced acquisition of knowledge and skills. All activities shift from teacher-centric to student centric and from passive to participatory pedagogies. Good relations are maintained with all stakeholders and college neighborhood network has been developed through participation of staff and students in many social activities and at times of natural calamity. This rural college bagged the best NSS programme officer award and for best NSS unit in 2016. College also bagged the best Kanyasree award for highest number of scholarship beneficiaries from this institution in 2019 from the state government of West Bengal. Token of appreciation received for active participation in the workshop on 'Save The Girl Child' program organized by department of health & family welfare, Govt. of West Bengal. The NCC girls' wing and the students involved in self defense programs have brought many accolades for the institution by participating in various state and national level competitions. These are the areas that make the authority proud as our mission is to craft proper human beings with basic human values and not just graduates with degree/diploma, certificates.

Even during the pandemic period that devastated the global education system, our dedicated teachers tried their level best to perform with the limitations of online education with poor internet connectivity in most

regions and parts of the college. Dissemination of knowledge was difficult but done by judicious use of social platforms and opportunities available during the crisis period that lasted for almost eighteen months. Considering all the achievements and growth that this institute has witnessed during the period from 2017-2022, the distinctiveness that marks the institution's uniqueness and thrust area is the trust and confidence it provides to the rural community for ages.

Ramsaday college in the district of Howrah, West Bengal is a rural college where students from the surrounding areas (covering 25-30 kms) have the unique opportunity to learn and grow. The institute offers 90 course programs/combinations in 18 honors and 25 general subjects. The success rate is more than 90% in all B.A., B.Com, B.Sc. and M.Sc programs (Average data of five years). In general course the success rate is 70%. There are instances where three generations have completed or enrolled and our aim is to create at least one graduate from each family in the neighborhood. In city based colleges, there are several opportunities for a student to pick up a course or a curriculum from many options available but in this region within a radius of 30-40 kms the choice is very limited. Our institution has come up with various programs in all three streams of Arts, Science and Commerce to fulfill their aspirations knowing very well that the authority needs to gear up to overcome many hurdles like shortage of faculty and facilities and increase in revenue budget. Resource persons from other colleges and institutes are invited for class lectures to fill up the void of full time faculty in new subjects introduced in the curriculum. Even the opportunity of post graduate education through distance and regular modes has been created for deserving ones. We feel proud to see students from all parts of the district and many of them travelling some 14-15 kilometers in bicycles even at backdrops of grueling summer days and harsh monsoon periods to reach their destinations where peace and glory greets them. Not only the students, the people of the region are assured of quality service from our dedicated staff and a congenial feel safe environment is created where teaching learning and academic discipline blossoms. The institution not only creates graduates but individuals of righteous conduct, peace, non-violence, citizenship values and life skills.

This unwavering commitment to holistic education has ensured wonderful legacy that will continue to live.

## 5. CONCLUSION

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### Additional Information :

A new three storied building was constructed after 2nd cycle of accreditation that has 14 class rooms and one guest room. Three class rooms exclusively for Geography department have been created from MP LAD in 2017. A class room in the department of Chemistry has been upgraded to A.P.C Ray gallery with ICT facilities. A virtual class room with 52” LED display screen and modern amenities has also been created from UGC XII plan period and RUSA grant. The college playground, free of any encroachment, measuring 120 mtrs x 80 mtrs has been developed with earth filling materials, leveled and then surrounded by ten feet high boundary wall on two sides. This has been possible by executing registered exchange deeds with parties who had their lands near the play ground area. College authority regularly pays land revenue for land held & used which is neither vested nor acquired. All infrastructure development has been taken considering the steady increase in student enrolment during last six to seven years.

? There is a waiting room for visitors and a guest room for outstation staff wishing to stay within the campus.

?Two subsidized canteens with food courts operate during college hours to ensure supply of food and beverages for staff and students. The solid waste from these canteens are collected periodically and processed into organic compost by students and staff of Chemistry department.

? There are fire extinguishers and smoke alarm devices at several strategic points as part of disaster management step. Aqua guard fitted water coolers available for staff and students. 60 KV green generator and battery supported servers to ensure uninterrupted power supply. All devices including the photocopiers are under annual maintenance contract. Teachers of the Physics department have developed electric devices indigenously to supply uninterrupted power in their practical experiments.

One of our passed out students in Commerce, one teaching and one non-teaching staff have contributed two lakhs each for renovation work within the campus. The governing body has duly recognized their contributions for such noble and selfless deeds. Contributions from teaching, non-teaching and student council that amounted to rupees two lakhs was donated to Chief Minister relief fund during the pandemic period. College received rupees one crore ten lakhs from the state government in 2018 and rupees ten lakhs from MPLAD in 2017 for construction purposes.. The college authority has taken all initiatives to explore the possibilities of getting financial assistance from the welfare schemes of industries and financial houses situated in the region.

### Concluding Remarks :

The college governing body in tune with the vision and mission of the institute is committed to providing quality education to all. Since quality education can be discharged by qualified, well trained and disciplined set of teachers, college has tried its best to fill whenever the vacant posts generated, with assistant professors through the West Bengal college service commission recruitment process. Out of 37 sanctioned posts (including the post of Principal and the librarian), 34 have been filled up and three (2 for Chemistry and 1 for

Commerce) are lying vacant owing to superannuation of teachers in these posts since 2022. The college authority has already submitted the claim for recruitment of full time faculties in these subjects and for creation of a second librarian post to the concerned authority for further enhancing the teaching learning process. Since a notice has been issued in August 2019, from the Higher Education department, Government of West Bengal, directing not to recruit teaching staff under any nomenclature whatsoever, several departments have shortage of teachers. Pupil teacher ratio is around 47 which is not conducive to healthy dissemination and share of knowledge. Exchange of faculty members with other colleges and universities has been adopted as a remedial means to minimize the problem. All programmes and activities have been designed as per student's needs and available institutional resources.

Recognizing, identifying and fostering the unique capabilities of each student to promote his/her holistic development is our challenge. The curriculum and credit framework for various Undergraduate programs allow students to experience courses from multiple disciplines that also integrates skill and ability enhancement courses. Our course components relating to health and wellness seek to promote an optima state of physical, self discipline, emotional, intellectual, spiritual person. Our focus on rural sports like Kho-Kho, Kabadi, Bratachari will help students acquire sports skills including basic movement skills. Community attachment through activities related to NCC, NSS, adult education, mentoring school students will expose our learners to the socio-economic issues in society so that theoretical learning can be supplemented by actual life experiences. All student centric activities recommended by IQAC plays an important role in promoting human as well as societal well being and in developing thoughtful, well rooted creative individuals.
